Gdansk as a Stopover:

- **Central Location:**

Gdansk is a convenient stopover point between Warsaw and other parts of northern Poland or the Baltic coast.

- **Day Trip Potential:**

Gdansk is part of the Tri-City area (including Gdynia and Sopot), which offers opportunities to explore the nearby and different coastal cities.

The surrounding areas offer attractions like Malbork Castle, the Hel Peninsula, and Kashubia, which can be explored on day trips.

- **Family-Friendly Activities:**

Gdansk boasts a vibrant food and drink scene, including traditional milk bars (Bar mleczny) and restaurants.

I was told an interesting idea is to visit the district of **Gdańsk—Oliwa**, where there is a beautiful park with the Archcathedral, the Pacholek viewing point, and the Zoo. You can get to these places by tram or the Fast Urban Railway (SKM).

You can also take a bus to the **Westerplatte Peninsula**, the place/symbol of the outbreak of World War II, which has an extremely interesting history. The peninsula's area and purpose have undergone numerous transformations over the years.

In the city centre, a wonderful place called **Hewelium**, located on **Gradowa Hill**, a great viewpoint, is worth visiting. It is the area of a medieval fortress and later forts associated with Napoleon.

The value of the Tourist Card cannot be underestimated.
